What if we don't have the Innkeeper to kick around anymore?



Warning: I'm going to nerd-out on one specific word from the Christmas story for a couple of paragraphs. It is the word commonly translated as "inn" in Luke 2:7, as in "there was no place for them in the inn." I think it will be worth your while.

There is a perfectly good Greek word for a commercial inn that would be operated by an innkeeper and would house guests for compensation. That word is *pandocheion*. Luke uses that word to describe the inn where the Good Samaritan drops off the wounded traveler in the famous parable (Luke 10:34). But that is not the word Luke uses in the Christmas story. Luke calls the place that has no room for Mary and Joseph a *kataluma* in Greek. This word is capable of several meanings, including a spare room in a home for guests (like the Upper Room in Luke 22:11), or a khan or caravansary. The word *kataluma* literally means to put down or to unyoke a draft animal or beast of burden. It is a place where after a long day on the road, a traveler would unburden his animal and rest.


The multiple ways the word *kataluma* is used in Greek means that we cannot be exactly sure what kind of place had no room for the Holy Family. Nor can we be sure what kind of place they wound up staying in. For example the first century apologist Justin Martyr claimed that Jesus was born in a cave in Bethlehem, and a cave is incorporated into The Church of the Nativity.

So sorry to break this to you, but we know enough about the contrast between the inn described in Luke 10 and the place described in Luke 2 to say with some certainty that wherever Mary and Joseph stayed, there was no innkeeper. And unlike our common manger scenes, we can also say with some certainty that Mary and Joseph did not stay in a detached shed that would hold animals. Almost all homes in Biblical Palestine housed animals and people in the same structure on different levels. The animals would be on the ground level and the people would either be on a raised dais or a second level.

I do have a purpose for claiming that our traditional crèche scene and all those sermons we've heard (or preached) over the years either vilifying or exonerating the mythical inn-keeper are a bit misleading. I want to engage you in an imaginative exercise. Perhaps we can we appreciate the scene of Jesus' birth with greater clarity when we don't have the innkeeper to kick around anymore.

Instead of the crèche scene, imagine a room or cave in Bethlehem crowded with tired travelers. Don't focus on the structure too much—that's the part we really don't know. Instead focus on the travelers. They perhaps have mats on the floor, and their travel necessities lying about. Maybe different groups each have a bit of space cleared out to have a meal. The people may be distant relatives who vaguely know each other. Helpful images to think of might be a hostel where people sleep in a common room or a temporary shelter packed to the gills after some natural disaster. The people who got there first claimed the best turf and staked out their space.



A man and a pregnant woman arrive. They scan the crowded scene and look at the faces. They are hoping someone will make eye-contact or someone will smile. Perhaps they are hoping to see a face they recognize. Most of all they are hoping that someone will wave them over and start shoving his or her possessions closer together to make a little more room. But the people



only glance back at Mary and Joseph warily. They are maxed out. They too have travelled some distance. They too have been displaced on account of the census. They have their own problems and their own families to worry about. There isn't enough room for all the people who have already squeezed together. And so the Bible tells us, "there was no place for them in the *kataluma*".

Mary and Joseph's pleas for help were not rejected by a single innkeeper who was either overwhelmed with guests or too callous to offer the traditional gift of hospitality to strangers. Mary and Joseph's need for a place to stay was rejected by their fellow travelers who had their own worries about where they were going to stay, and who were also uprooted from their homes.

Each of us chooses whether to acknowledge another's hopeful glance or not. Each of us faces the choice about whether our own problems, worries and insecurities will stand in the way of our making a connection with another human being in need. We face these decisions not only as individuals, but as churches and as nations. Loving humanity in general isn't really that difficult. Loving people as individuals often requires some rearranging of the stuff of our own lives, and that's never an easy decision. Can we make room? Can we yield?

"From Worry to Wonder" A Christmas Message from Bishop Laurie

On June 19, 2020 our granddaughter was born. She was born three months into the pandemic. Her parents were worried. Her grandparents were worried. It is challenging enough to be pregnant and give birth in the best of times but to give birth in the middle of a worldwide pandemic is an even greater worry. We worried about the unknown dangers this virus might present to the mother, the unborn baby, and the new born baby. Our worries kept us up at night. Our worries were relieved when she was finally born, perfect in every way. Our worry gave way to wonder-filled joy. Worry transformed to wonder as we looked back to see how God was holding and carrying them through the unavoidable worry. Our worry transformed to gratitude and wonder watching for what God would be up to next in her tiny life.

It's December 2022. We prepare to celebrate the birth our Lord Jesus. This Advent we come with our fears and worries too. We are living in the midst of challenging times in our country. The very foundation of our nation seems less stable. We each come with our own personal set of worries and fears about our families, health, finances, work, safety, the future...What is it that keeps you up at night? What are you worried about today?

Folks across our church are experiencing doubts and uneasiness about the future of their church. Does it keep you up at night? What are the threats to your church's future? Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. Luke 2:8-10a

Shepherds living in the fields watched over their sheep to keep them safe. There were dangers that kept the shepherds up at night and plenty of things for the shepherd's to worry about in the cold night like wild animals, predators, thieves, & bad weather. There was so much to worry about, but one night an angel of the Lord, all shiny and bright appeared and transformed their fears and worldly worry to divine wonder.

To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." 


