Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this final yearly report for you, I cannot but think of the ancient Roman god Janus that our month of January is named after. Janus is the god of beginnings, endings, doorways and transitions. In sculptures and pictures Janus is depicted with a face pointing forward and a face pointing backward. You and I are both about to enter a time of transition. So, in this report, like Janus I wish to look both backward and forward.

I entered 2022 still recovering from my cancer surgery. I want to thank you as a parish for your understanding and patience during the early months of the year when I was recovering and regaining my strength.

One area that I focused on throughout the year was the development of RUTH (Rural Unity through Hope) as a faith-based organization. RUTH's first public event was a prayer vigil in March outside the Trempealeau County Courthouse in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Throughout the year RUTH attracted leaders, volunteers, partners and some financial contributions. After the vigil, RUTH recruited leadership for the local Sleep in Heavenly Peace chapter and organized a health fair as an outreach effort toward the Trempealeau County Latin American community. RUTH provides a network for congregations to coordinate their various ministries like providing winter clothes for people reentering society from the Trempealeau County Jail. I retire in hope that RUTH will continue to flourish as an organization and find new opportunities to share Christ's love in our rural context.

With sadness, I and the rest of Whitehall and Pigeon said farewell to my colleague Pastor Mary Ann Bowman in late spring. I remain deeply appreciative for the partnership among our churches during her ministry. The current shortage of pastors in the ELCA has revived some old methods and inspired some new approaches to help congregations through leadership transitions. (continued on page 4)

For Lent 2023 the theme of our round-robin Wednesday evening services will be, "Sing with All the saints in Glory".

Lutherans have a wonderful understanding of sinners and saints, all of us who have through baptism died to sin and are righteous saints of God. We have a rich calendar of saints in the Lutheran tradition-Christians from every age who have pointed to Christ in their living and dying. Through them we find inspiration for our Christian journeys. Celebrated during the five Wednesdays of March, 2023, this Lenten midweek series honors the commemorations that occur during the season this year.

<u>Week "A</u>": 'Inheritance of Faith'; George Herbert; John Wesley and Charles Wesley.—**March 1st—Natalie Leske**

George was a renowned English Anglican country priest. The Wesley brothers were Anglican priests, missionaries to America, founders of the Methodist Church and instrumental in the Great Awakening of the 18th and 19th centuries. *Readings; Psalm 145:1-13, 2 Timothy 1:1-14*

<u>Week "B":</u> 'Perseverance with Endurance"; Perpetua and Felicity; Harriet Tubman and Sojourner Truth. - <u>March 8th—Augie Hohl</u>

Perpetua and felicity were early Christian martyrs who chose their faith in Christ and their commitment to each other over life. Harriet Tubman was a Moses to her people, leading slaves to freedom. Sojourner Truth was a New York slave who sued for her freedom and then spent the rest of her life working for abolition, universal suffrage, and preaching Christ throughout the country. *Readings; Isaiah 61:1-4, Hebrews* 12:1-2, 12-13

Week "C": 'Faithful in Prayer'; Gregory the Great; Patrick—March 15th—Dave Christianson

Gregory was a sixth century pope known as "the father of Christian worship", revising liturgy and developing church music. Patrick was a missionary to Ireland, famous for bringing the good news of Christ to the Irish and for his defense of the Trinity. *Readings; Isaiah 55:6-12, Ephesians 1:15-23*

Week "D"; 'Striving for Justice'; Joseph; Oscar Romero—March 22nd—Valerian Ahles

Oscar Romero was martyred while celebrating mass in 1980. As priest and Archbishop, he was an outspoken critic of corruption and the oppression of the people of El Salvador. He was certain that the heart of the Gospel is centered on God's compassion for the poor and the liberation of all people. In Joseph we see how holy family became refugees at the hand of a tyrant ruler. *Readings; Isaiah 58:6-9, Matthew 25:31-40*

Week "E"; 'Dying and Rising with Christ'; Hans Nielsen Hauge, John Donne—March 29th—Luke Pederson

Hans Hauge was a 19th century Norwegian lay preacher who reawakened the faith of an entire country and its immigrants to America. John Donne was a 17th century English poet and dean of

St. Paul's Cathedral in London. Both were fervent and clear proclaimers of the amazing grace of God. Readings; Romans 6:3-11, Revelation 7:9-17

The Northwest Synod of Wisconsin appointed me to serve as the Administrative Pastor for Peace Lutheran until an interim pastor became available. Having a local pastor assist a vacant congregation was not uncommon decades ago, and it is likely this approach will become more common in the future.

Leadership transitions can be times of worry for any organization. As human beings we get used to people who are familiar to us and we even put up with their faults. But transition times can also be times of new vision and creativity. During a pastoral vacancy, a congregation can honestly assess their ministry and health with a little more freedom because the assessment is not about a specific person, but the community as a whole.

Customarily when a pastor leaves you see some turnover in lay-leadership and new people bring new ideas. This is a good thing when it is blended with the wisdom of experienced leaders who have walked through pastoral transitions before and know that the ministry of a church is more than the pastor. In an interim period, congregations' partnership with the synod is intensified because of the synod's role in the call process. The synod ministers can bring a bit of an aerial view to a parish and help them see their ministry in new ways. And your interim pastor and newly called pastor will bring their own gifts and perspective to your ministry. All of these factors together can make a time of transition a time of hope and renewal.

I want to conclude by saying that I give thanks for the honor of serving Whitehall and Pleas-antville as your minister. During my time among you I was privileged to witness your love for God, your churches and your community in the way you serve, give and walk together as disciples of Jesus. And this love you have shown to me as your pastor and to each other and a broken world in need is of course a reflection of the love of God. The familiar words of the Apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 13 are often read at weddings. But a closer reading reveals that they are really about life together in the church. "And now faith, hope, and love remain, these three, and the greatest of these is love."

Each year on Ash Wednesday ashes are smudged on our foreheads in the sign of the cross as we hear the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Old and young come forward. Even little babies receive the mark—though it seems impossible, they too will one day die.

The 40 days of Lent begin with a ritual which reminds us all that indeed our days are counted. We all will only have so much time on this earth, and then we will return to it.

These 40 days are a season of repentance. As I count the days to Easter, I must ask myself, "What must I begin doing that I have left undone? What must I stop doing that I have done now that I realize that my days are counted?" I have been living as if I have all the time in the world, when I know that I only have the time that God has allotted me.

I think the season of Lent is especially hard for us in this northern climate. Ash Wednesday usually begins when the cold winter winds show no sign of letting up. We celebrate Easter in mid-April when spring has barely established a foothold against the grip of winter. Even our climate seems to be teaching us that holding out hope for the future requires faith.

"For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." Romans 8:24-25

The days of Lent are numbered to remind us that the days of our lives are numbered too. A prayer I find very meaningful reads:

"Speak to us once more your solemn message of life and of death. Help us to live as those who are prepared to die. And when our days here are accomplished, enable us to die as those who go forth to live, so that living or dying, our life may be in you, and that nothing in life or in death will be able to separate us from your great love in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen."


